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presidential viewpoint



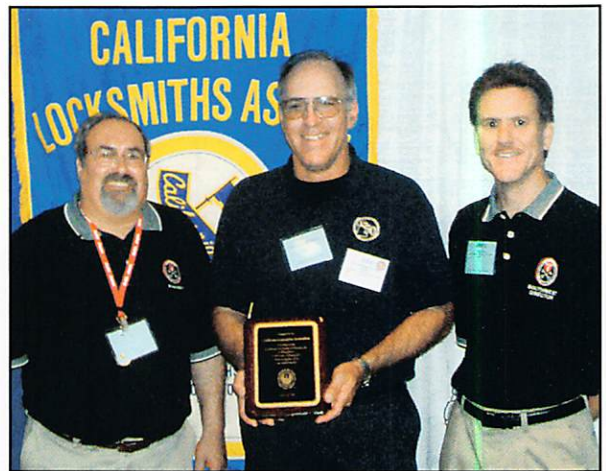
Dear Members,

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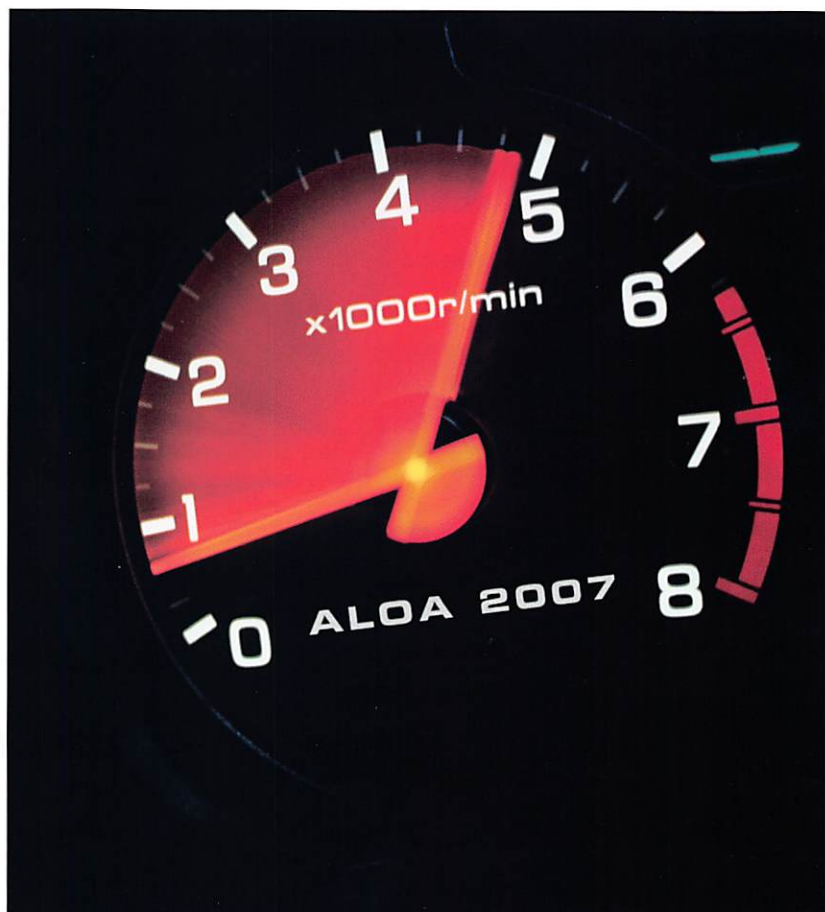

Al Van Alstyne, owner of Hoboken Lock on Washington Street, in Hoboken, N.J., won a \$2,000 replica of the U.S.S. Constitution as part of a sales promotion jointly sponsored by Accredited Lock of Secaucus, N.J. and CCL Security Products, Wheeling, IL, a division of The Eastern Company.

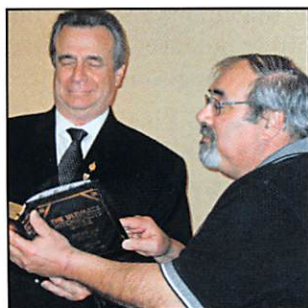

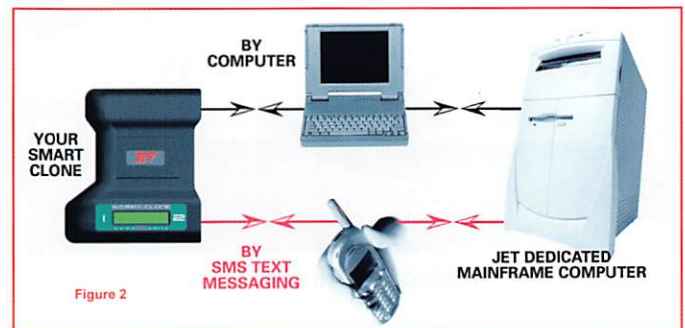

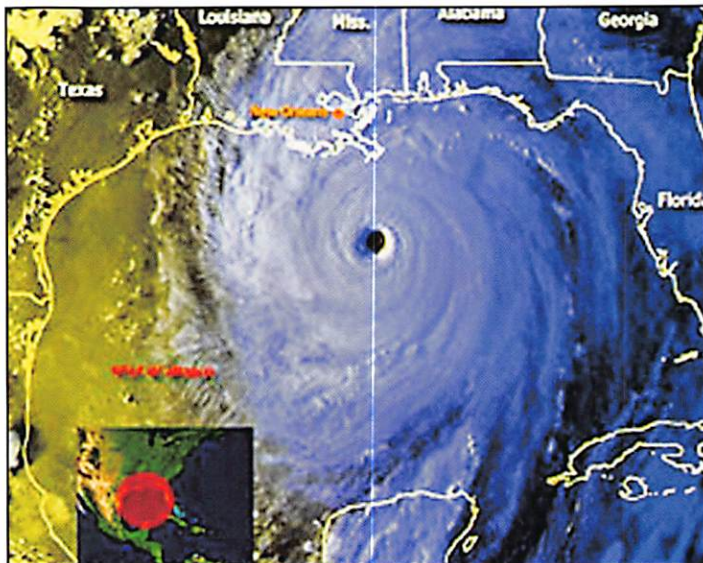

Like the Phoenix Rising

One year. It has been twelve months since I made my trip to the Gulf Coast to survey the damage to my hometown, Gulfport Mississippi, and the surrounding areas in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. 365 days ago, my relatives living on the coast told me to stay in Texas, do not come home, its not the same. But I was determined to see for myself. After all, I had survived Hurricane Camille in 1969, at the time the worst storm to hit the United States on record. The storm that we all swore would never be repeated in our lifetime. Once I arrived in Gulfport in the spring of 2006, I was devastated. The carnage left by the storm, the lives lost, the childhood locations damaged or destroyed was almost too much to bear. As I wrote that article one year ago, it was very therapeutic. And the more I wrote, the more I remembered the resilience of the people there and was sure that they would recover and things would be better than before. So it was with this thought in mind that I decided to return to Gulfport and check the progress, looking for a happy ending to a sad chapter.

As I drove through South Mississippi, the thing that struck me first was the lack of trees. Prior to Katrina, all along Interstate 10, trees were in abundance on both sides of the highway and so thick that you literally could not see daylight among them. A year ago, the trees still existed but a good majority were broken and twisted and leaning severely enough that the roots came through the top soil. Today, there are stretches of I-10 that have no trees beside the road and the foliage is so thinned that you can see through to secondary tree lines hundreds of yards from the roadway. The other thing that strikes me is the lack of green. Usually this time of year, the leaves on most of the trees are turning a vibrant green and the needles of the pine trees are almost always that same shade. Now, the coloration is sporadic. The intensive concentration of salt water heaped upon these trees during the storm from blowing water and rain has everything a lovely shade of 70's earth tone brown.

But there are signs of recovery here. A year ago, all of the highrise billboards along this stretch of Interstate looked like a mangled, tangled mess of steel and paper, a tinker toy experiment gone horribly awry. Now those same billboards contain signs advertising the return of casino's both old and new, restaurants and mercantile establishments. All with an uplifting message of rebuilding and recovering. Already this trip is yielding some positive feelings.

The first stop I make is at the corner of 25th Avenue and 19th Street at the location of Pete's Electric, the company where my grandfather learned locksmithing. Back in 2006

when I visited, all that remained of what must have been about a 7000 square foot building was a pile of wood and metal on a concrete slab. One end of the building was totally down while the other remained upright but unstable. Today, there is nothing but a vacant lot. (pic – Pete’s Slab) Not even a small remnant of what once was.

However, across the street I notice a small block building. On the sign, “PETE’S ELECTRIC”. (pic – New Facility) The owners have taken the hand dealt them and moved on. They have moved their operation into a much smaller building but have remained close to the location they have occupied for so many decades, thus remaining easy for their customers to locate. Business, and life, goes on. Will they rebuild on the empty lot, probably. Will they let Katrina and its aftermath shut them down, absolutely not. Recovery continues.

Next stop, the location of Hancock Lock and Key, the last vestige of the family business started by my grandfather. Though no one in the immediate family has been involved in its operation in recent years, it still has a special meaning to us because obviously it was the beginning of a life-long career for almost everyone in my family. All of my uncles, some aunts, step brothers, half brothers, cousins, nieces, possibly even the family pets have been locksmiths at some point or another because of this little company. When last I visited, all that remained was a couple of columns from the roof support, a lot of debris and a slab. I am told keys and lock parts and even a safe were found scattered over several blocks after the storm. Today, virtually nothing remains. Just a slab with a few trees around it, (pic – Hancock Lock and Key) and appropriately enough, a sign advertising demolition and debris removal. If you look at the tree just to the left of the slab, during the height of the storm, the surge from the gulf which is about 1/2 mile in the background and 10 feet below the slab level, was up near the top of the tree. That’s over 25 feet of water with waves crashing in another 10-12 feet above that. Just unbelievable.

But out of this rubble again rises hope. About 200 yards from where the shop once stood, amid all the barren land, is a house under construction. (pic – house on pilings) It is being built on pilings to comply with new ordinances required for building along the coast line, but the bottom line is that it is being built. Another resurrection.

I drove down Highway 90 along the beach looking at the places where the once majestic antebellum homes stood. The stately mansions that had endured so many storms and hurricanes over decades and even centuries were now gone. Some of the most historic homes in the country like Beauvoir, the last home of Jefferson Davis, the President of the Confederacy. (pic – beauvoir pre) A beautiful piece of history and architecture, open to the public for visits. Now (pic – beauvoir) just broken and twisted wood. Then there was Boggsdale. It had stood for over a hundred years and was the home of Robert Boggs, the writer and artist. Also

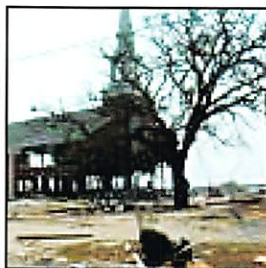

part of this historic family was Statesman Hale Boggs and National News Correspondent Cokie Roberts. (-pic – boggsdale)



Downtown Gulfport shows the contrast vividly of what things looked like immediately after the storm as well as how far they have progressed in a relatively short time. Downtown still shows the ravages of the high water and deadly winds. (pic – downtown 2). There are many office buildings like this old structure which housed law firms and realty agents, that are still boarded up and vacant. (pic – downtown) If you look closely at the brick you can still see the water line about three feet below the upper floor windows. Just two blocks away is where the First Baptist Church stood. Last year the sight of the church was something to behold. (pic – First Baptist) Today all that remains is the steeple, awaiting a rebuild so it may be placed back atop. (pic – steeple) A little further up the beach from the old Church lot is an all too familiar sight, the FEMA trailer. (pic – FEMA) The occupants of this trailer are struggling with the rebuilding process like many along the coast due to insurance delays and shortages of materials. The lot and slab that the trailer is sitting on is valued at \$600 thousand dollars and is still mortgaged. You have to love red tape. The lot next door shows the contrast. This house was completed about 3 months ago. (pic – new house) Just a few blocks away is the new Island View Casino and Resort. (pic – new casino) Truly a testament to the resilience of the coastal residents. Not much more than a year ago the same area along Highway 90 looked like this. (pic – beach after)

And lastly, the thing you notice the most is the beach itself. (pic – beach) The calm smooth waters of the gulf, nice breeze, white sand. This is the way I remember Gulfport and the coastal areas the most as do most that have visited. This is also the most lasting image from my recent visit because all of the water born debris that lay on the sand beach and highway, all the debris floating in the water, the trees and limbs sticking up from the water, all gone. The beach looks exactly the way in did pre-Katrina. The way it has looked as long as I can remember. It is still hard to see the calm gulf waters and image it causing the damage that it caused.

The trip proved again to be therapy for me and my family. I did not want the images left by the news coverage and by my last trip to be with me as the way I remembered “home”. Just as after Hurricane Camille in 1969, the Coastal residents have proven that though they may be knocked down by disasters, they will not allow them to keep them down. Like the Phoenix rising from the ashes, the coast is experiencing a rebirth.

After the damage of hurricane Katrina had been assessed, ALOA took action by constructing a website completed dedicated to helping those who lost their livelihood. Many of our members in the affected areas lost their shops and tools, and many of them lost their homes. This website offered a point of contact for members all over the country to offer assistance to those who needed it most. More than 30 companies and individuals logged on to offer employment. Others offered both employment and housing and some offered equipment and tools. Along with jobs and housing, many of our members took advantage of our online donation system to give monetarily.

In light of the response to this disaster, ALOA has decided to make this an ongoing effort to provide relief for those members who face unexpected hardships. The ALOA Disaster Relief Fund will serve to offer financial assistance to those who face disasters of any kind, whether it is a natural disaster such as Katrina or another loss such as fire - or even extraordinary circumstances such as terrorist attacks. Already some of the money we have received has been used for those who have endured hardship from Katrina. This assistance has been greatly appreciated.

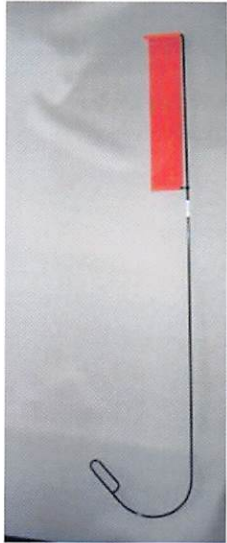

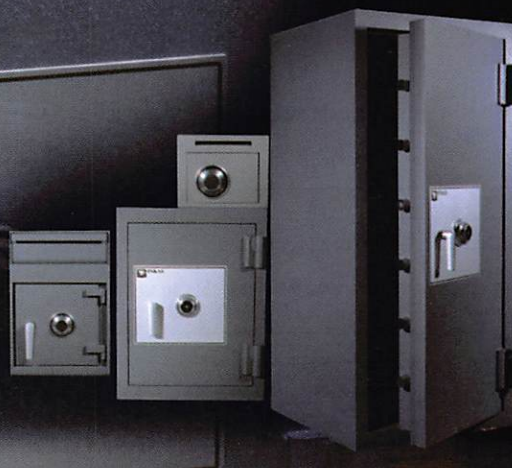

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How to “Handle” a Major

Major Safe has always been known for creating quality safes. They produced round doors, fire safes, square doors, and even lug doors. Their TL design commands respect among safecrackers. The TL rated safes pictured in this article were made around 1992 shortly before American Security Products or AMSEC purchased Major Safe. The two safes pictured in this article were produced prior to this merger. Parts for these safes are still available from AMSEC. These safes did not need to be opened, instead they needed a little work after being neglected for several years; the customer also wanted them stacked.

We found a bent handle on one and the detent pivot on the other was broken. Disassembling these safes is not difficult; it's the reassembling that can be a little challenging. The bolt extension spring is heavy and if you use your fingers to move it into place it can leave them a little bruised, better to use pliers to assemble this door.

Major Safe has always been known for creating quality safes.

Disassembling starts with removing the sheet metal door cover, then lock back cover, this will fire the relock, or does it? The relock seen up close in photos 2 and 3 on this design is designed to fire not only if the lock back cover is punched but also if the handle cam is punched.

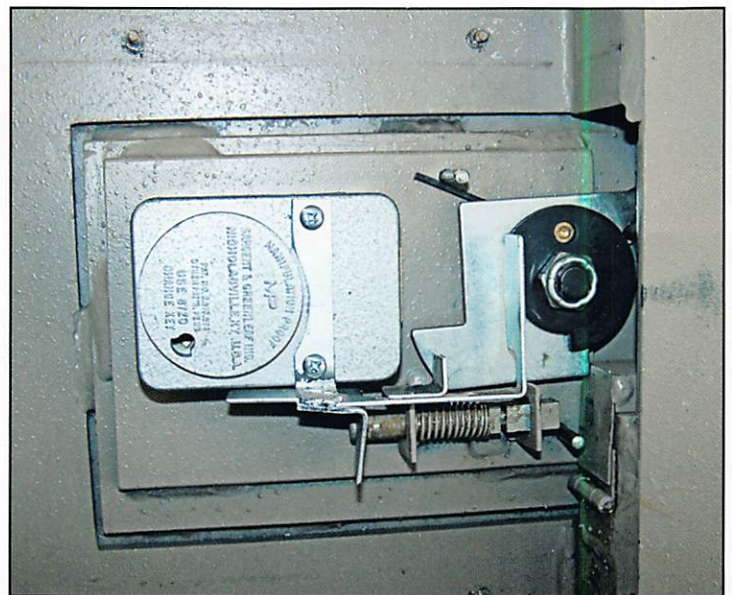

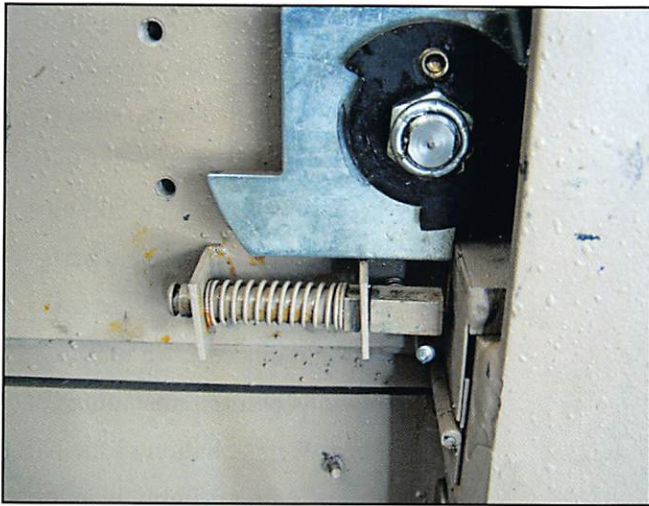

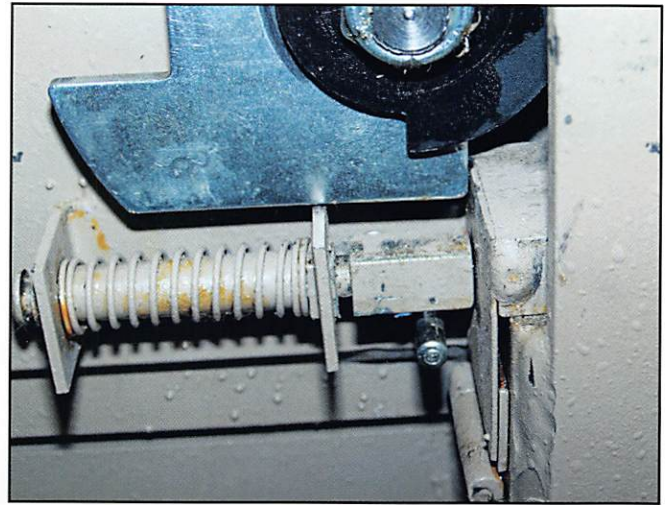

The relock plunger is designed to push or fire against the hinged flapper. There is a cutout in the bolt seen in photo 4 that effectively keeps the plunger from being pushed back. When the plunger is against the flapper it keeps it from moving. The gap between the end of the relock plunger and flapper is too great on both these safes. On both doors the handle still turns with the back cover removed. The relock mounting bracket on both safes were mounted a little too far away from the hinged flapper to prevent the flapper from moving out of the way. Bending the bracket towards the flapper solved this problem. Keep this in mind if you ever run into one of these safes after a burglary attempt, the handle might just turn or turn with a little persuasion from a deadblow hammer on the door. If not probably the best option is to drill and punch the bracket of the door.

The lock is removed in a very standard way by removing the spline key and because this is an S&G 8400 series lock, then the inner spindle. Next unscrew the dial from the drive cam, remove it and unscrew the lock mounting screws to remove it. Getting back to the replacement of the handle and the detent trigger, lets look at the

handle system. Since the lock is now removed the next step is to remove the nut seen in photo 5 on the back of the handle. Photo 6 shows what happens as the cam plate is removed, the spring and the three-piece arbor

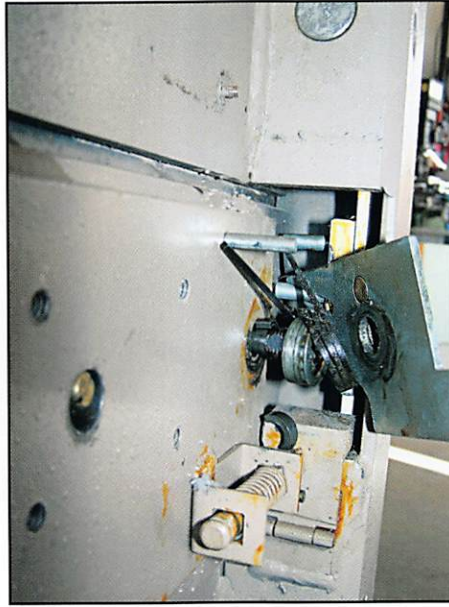

assembly fall apart. In the picture you can see one half of two-piece arbor still on the shaft and the second lying below the shaft on top of the relock plunger. Normally at this point the handle cam assembly can be reassembled with a new spring or in this case a new handle. Before reassembling this safe we'll take a look at the boltwork normally covered by a welded in channel.

The two bolts can only be removed after the cam is removed. Looking back at photo 5 you can see a chrome cap covering a hole in the welded channel for the bottom bolt and the exposed hole over the top bolt. Once the cam is removed the bolt bar seen in

photo 7 can move a little further down allowing the removal of the roll pins that act as the connection between the bolts and the bolt bar. After the roll pins are both removed all the parts can be removed from the safe door. In this case we lubricated the bolts before reinstalling them. Reinstallation of the handle and cam assembly is in the reverse order of disassembly; the difficult part is keeping the spring in position as the cam is

installed on the shaft. The best method I have found is to use a pair of pliers to hold the spring as the cam is installed. It might not be perfect but it saves the fingers.

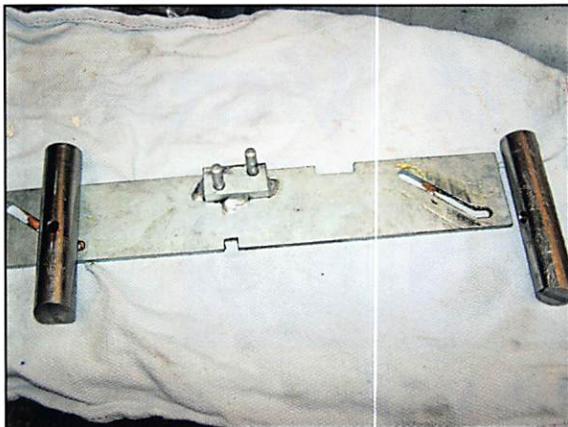

The other safe door seen in photo 9 and 10 needed the bolt detent replaced. This is easily accomplished by tapping out the solid pin or axle seen in photo 10 and replacing the detent plate. Next the two safes were carefully stacked one on top of the other and holes drilled between the two units to bolt them together at the front of the safes. A strap was applied across the back to

secure the two units together. This will allow them to be easily separated in the future if the customer's needs change.

Major Safe Company safes will be around for a good long time, even though they are no longer produced. Understanding how they operate and how to service them will earn you lots of money into the future.
